EXCITING NEWS FOR ST. IGNATIUS

More good news for St. Ignatius Catholic School! St. Ignatius Catholic School is thrilled to announce that we have received a \$1.1M grant from the J.A. and Kathryn Albertson Family Foundation that will assist us in granting additional tuition assistance, provide teachers with professional development opportunities, help fund the necessary tools to develop and implement our innovative academic design (combining individualized learning plans, station rotation, blended learning and inquiry learning), and offset anticipated operational deficits the first few years.

The JKAF Foundation noted that St. Ignatius is "likely the first Catholic school in the country – certainly in Idaho – to fully embrace core concepts associated with 21st century learning. This is reflected in the school's flexible learning spaces, innovative uses of learning technologies and varied instructional groupings."

This grant is a culmination of work that began in the fall of 2016 when the JKAF Foundation provided St. Ignatius with a \$100,000 planning grant. This planning grant allowed school leadership to partner with Bluum, a non-profit organization dedicated to growing successful school models in Idaho, and Bellwether Education Partners. These partners have tremendous experience in developing innovative, successful education programs. They provided St. Ignatius school leaders with research, guidance, and an opportunity to visit schools around the country to learn about and observe successful models in education. School leaders were then able take the best of everything learned and observed, and incorporate the particular elements that were determined to fit best with our community, our mission statement, and our philosophy.

Once school leaders created the academic model that would allow us to best achieve our mission, we applied for a grant that would give us the necessary funding to implement and support our educational model. We were acutely aware that an education model such as ours would only be successful with proper teacher training and professional development, the necessary curriculum and technology materials, and the financial support for our general operating budget to allow us to keep class sizes small as we launch our program. The \$1.1M grant from the J.A. and Kathryn Albertson Family Foundation makes all of that possible.

"We are excited to have this investment in our educational model," stated Andi Kane, principal. "These resources will help us achieve our vision from the start rather than struggling the first few years. This generous grant allows us to implement our programs such as MakerSpace and individualized learning from day one."

Mrs. Kane noted, "We are eternally grateful for the support provided by the J.A. and Kathryn Albertson Family Foundation in providing this funding and appreciate their faith in our program."

FUNDING ST. IGNATIUS

Did you know that for the 2017-2018 school year, the actual cost to educate each St. Ignatius student is \$6,500.00? As parents know, the tuition paid for each student is substantially less than \$6,500.00. That means that *every* student that attends St. Ignatius during the 2017-2018 school year is receiving financial assistance. Furthermore, we provide additional need based financial assistance to any family that qualifies. We do this because we want St. Ignatius to be accessible to as many families as possible.

So how do we do it? Our ability to maintain affordable tuition for all, and financial assistance to those who need it, depends on the philanthropic generosity of manythrough grants, individual gifts and donations, fundraising and subsidization from the Holy Apostles Parish. These gifts "bridge the gap" between the actual cost to educate a student at St. Ignatius and the amount of tuition paid for each student. In addition, these gifts allow us to maintain facilities, improve our library and technology resources and provide continuing professional development for our faculty.

We are continuously investigating and pursuing grant opportunities such as the **IKAF** Foundation Grant. However. fundraising and donations from within our own community are essential for us to succeed with this financial model. Our HSA is working hard to plan 3 major fundraising events for this school year and we are hopeful that all families in our community will participate in and attend these events. In addition, we will be having an annual donation drive in October/November, and will provide families with more information at that time about the tax benefits of donating to the school. Finally, families can help us by participating in kick-back and rewards programs- things like Fred Meyer's Community Rewards, Amazon Smiles, Scips, and UND Credit Union—that we will be rolling out throughout this year. These programs offer an opportunity for the school to receive a rebate or portion of proceeds from purchases you already make. We will be advising you about these opportunities in the months to come and we hope that you will continue your support.

This first two weeks at St. Ignatius has been incredible! We are so blessed to have such amazing students, teachers, staff, families. We have been putting a significant amount of time and energy into creating our school culture and forming strengthening our community. A culture that fosters learning, love, growth, reverence, and social justice, along with a strong sense of community, is vital to our mission and will benefit our students in so many different ways.

Mrs. Johnson and I have visited every classroom in this last two weeks and are beginning to introduce the concepts of our school-wide Behavioral Growth Plan. We also discussed how our emotions can sometimes take us off of that Path. It is important for students to learn that all emotions are okay, but that there are expected and unexpected ways to show our emotions. We will be giving the students tools that they can use to control their emotions so that they can stay on The Path.

I look forward to spending more time in the classroom teaching these concepts that are so important to our students' social/emotional development. I hope you will ask your students about what they have learned and encourage them to use their tools at home!
