

Dear St. Ignatius Catholic School Community,

One of my proudest days as principal of St. Ignatius was March 21st, the day of our Faith in Action Fair. If you scan our website, our school communications, or even this very publication, the Howl, you will see the slogan, "Growing leaders who turn faith into action". Our Lenten season at St. Ignatius was proof that our students are both growing into leaders and are turning their faith in God into tangible action in the world.

During Lent, students learned about the seven principles of Catholic Social Teaching:

- Care for God's Creation
- Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers
- Life and Dignity of the Human Person
- Call to Family, Community, and Participation
- Solidarity
- Option for the Poor and Vulnerable
- Rights and Responsibilities

They were then asked to identify a personal interest or passion along with a problem in the community or world and design a project to address that issue. 4th-8th grade students conducted individual projects, while our PreK-3rd grade students worked together as a class.

Within a week of kicking off these projects mid-February, I had a handful of eager students in my office, presenting their "pitch" (all students had to pitch their projects to teachers). One of our 7th grade students had an entire proposal written and rehearsed, along with a request to offer a free-dress day to support an organization he had already researched and for which he found great passion. His well-organized plan, passion, and initiative merited him the coveted "free dress day" privilege.

A second grade student blew me away when within weeks she had come up with a project to collect small stuffed animals for children in hospitals. Having spent time in the hospital as a young child herself, she remembered the comfort those small tokens brought to her. Her stuffed animal drive brought in hundreds of stuffed animals that she was able to deliver to our local children's hospital. (continued on page 3....)

GREAT THINGS HAPPENING! LENT

Lent was a wonderful season at St. Ignatius Catholic School. From our Faith in Action Projects/Fair to the Living Stations of the Cross to our weekly prayer service—living our faith was certainly in focus.

During the Lenten Season, our students created and brought to life social justice projects. In younger grades, these projects were completed by each class. In upper grades, each student worked on an individual project. Students showed great passion and creativity for their projects. These projects ranged from community awareness efforts to fundraising to hands on service. On March 21st, these students presented their projects in a visual format in classrooms and hallways (on trifold, poster boards, computer presentations, etc.) at our Faith in Action Fair. (Think of it as a science fair but with service projects!) Parents and community members were invited to walk around and observe how our students are turning their FAITH into ACTION!

In addition, each week during Lent our students started their week with a prayer service lead by Mrs. Kane. This weekly service included song, a gospel reading, and education about the different precepts of Catholic Social Teaching. Our student body ended each week by praying the Examen together to close out our week.

Our 2nd-8th grade classes also spent time in the sacrament of Reconciliation. Lent is such an important time for reflection, reconciliation, and forgiveness. Our student body focused on all of these important actions of faith during Reconciliation and throughout Lent.

Finally, our student body ended the Lenten Season with a Living Stations of the Cross performed by the 8th grade students. This was a powerful and moving experience for all of our students and all in attendance.

One of my favorite moments from our presentation day was watching a young fourth grader explain his project. He had worked to raise money and items for the humane society. He had clearly learned so much about shelters and how they help stray animals. "I can't wait until I'm twelve," he exclaimed, "so I can volunteer at the shelter". Not only did his project have an impact on needy animals, but clearly, his project made an impact on him.
















REFLECTION: APRIL- RESURRECTION

After many days on the Lenten journey, we can now yell and say Alleluia! Christ has risen! He has risen indeed! What a beautiful and deep event to ponder. The Resurrection of our Lord is considered to be not only, a big feast for the Church, but to be "The Feast" from where all others work around. This does make sense since this mystery of life is the base of our Christian Faith. According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church 652, "Christ's Resurrection is the fulfillment of the promises both of the Old Testament and of Jesus himself during his earthly life." Jesus' Resurrection can be a great reminder of the new life He has given and is constantly calling us to. Here are some suggestions to share and live the faith at home.

- 1. <u>Story Time:</u> On April 29th we celebrate St. Catherine of Siena. She was a very influential Catholic Theologian for her time. She was born on March 17, 1347 to a large family. She was always connected to God from a very young age. Take time to watch/read her Biography and discuss on why she still touches many lives today.
- 2. <u>Prayer Time:</u> Divine Mercy is this year is on April 8th. This Feast allows us to focus on the Divine Mercy that God has for all His children. Pray a Divine Mercy Chaplet together as a family. A chaplet follows the same repetitious style as the Rosary only shorter and with a specific theme. - 3. <u>Simple Reminders:</u> Easter Sunday falls on April 1st this year but the season lasts for fifty days. A great way to keep the Resurrection fresh in our minds during the whole month, would be to make a Resurrection Garden together! The garden can be customized to fit each family. - 4. <u>Friends in High Places:</u> St. Mark's Feast day is on April 25th. He was the author of one of the Gospels of the New Testament. During the week of the 25th, add the Gospel of Mark to your dinner/family time. Take turns reading from the Bible. Use a Bible that is child friendly such as the Catholic Children's Bible so everyone can understand what is going on in the Gospel.

Dear St. Ignatius Community,

I thank you for your continued prayers, support, notes, and well-wishes as I hang here on hospital bedrest until our baby is born. We know that the power of prayers has helped our little one stay put so far. When my waters broke at 25 weeks gestation, we knew it was likely that labor would come soon. Thankfully, we are still here, now 27 weeks, and giving our little one a better chance with every passing day. Please keep the prayers coming.

Did you know that St. Ignatius spent six months on bedrest after his leg suffered a brutal injury in the Battle of Pamplona? While he laid in bed healing with little to do (I can't imagine not having my smart phone and computer in this situation!), he spent time reading two books- one about the life of Christ and another about the lives of the Saints. It was during this time that St. Ignatius began to shift his desire for fame and glory as a soldier to a desire to imitate the holy lives of the saints. His six months on bedrest changed everything. Upon his recovery he began his conversion, dedicated his life to Christ, and started down the path that would eventually lead to the creation of the Society of Jesus and his own sainthood.

My bedrest journey probably isn't molding me into a saint, but I will say that the time I've had to pause and reflect has been profound. I've had time to really rest in the love that I have for my family, friends, and for our school and community. I've been able to see clearly what is really important and what is not. I'm settling with the calling to let go of my own plans and surrender to the unknown- however scary or unpleasant it might seem.

I know that the school is in great hands in my absence. I continue to stay included in the happenings from my hospital bed and am doing small things as I can. Our team approach to school leadership and administration has set up the school to function well in my absence. We have a great team with great people in place to cover my responsibilities temporarily.

I am so grateful to you all for your support. The outpouring of love and prayers is a testament to the greatness of the St. Ignatius community. We may be young, but we are strong. I pray for you all and thank you for your prayers during this unknown time for our family.
