

## A WORD FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear St. Ignatius Catholic School Family,

"Could a greater miracle take place than for us to look through each other's eyes for an instant?"

These words of Henry David Thoreau resonate during this fall full of eyes. After half a year apart, our staff and students reunited in our building this August for a phased-in approach to in person learning. Seeing the eyes of our students gleaming with joy at the real physical presence of their friends and teachers is a blessing no one can take for granted.

At times during those first days back at school it was hard to recognize one another. After all, six months of childhood and the sunshine of summer bring about many physical changes in a child, and combined with the newness of masks hiding the missing teeth and broad grins of students bounding back into the building, recognition could be challenging. One day early on, thinking I was talking to a new student, I asked a first grader what her name was and had an emphatic response, "Mrs. Kane! I've been here since preK!" (I hadn't recognized her face behind that mask).

## FACTS & FIGURES

493

493 PreK-8th grade students are currently being served by St. Ignatius Catholic School and our 58 staff members. We continue to exceed our enrollment expectations despite the challenges of the 2020/2021 school year.

100%

100% of our students are offered tuition at a rate that is below our actual cost to educate and 98% receive an additional tuition discount of some kind. Our tuition remains consistent with other Catholic schools in our area and is well below the tuition rates of most private schools in the area.

100% of our Pre-K-8th grade students participate is service and social justice projects in connection with our Faith in Action Fair, providing assistance to 100s of organizations in the Treasure Valley, across our state and around the world.

The average RIT percentile score of St. Ignatius students on NWEA nationally referenced testing exceeded the national average for both public and Catholic schools at EVERY grade level in both math and reading.



While this has been an unprecedented and unsettling time for our community, our nation, and our world, we have much to celebrate as we begin Year 4 of St. Ignatius Catholic School. As we all grapple to cope with the devastation caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, St. Ignatius has been working hard to provide a new normal for our students—finding ways to continue providing high quality education, while doing our best to protect the health and safety of our community.

As you likely know, we began our school closure on March 16, 2020 along with other area schools. While we had no idea how long this closure would last, our school made a commitment to creating a remote learning program that would honor the integrity and mission of our school to carry us through any required social distancing period. It was agreed that St. Ignatius would strive to be an area of support, structure, consistency, and connection for our students and families during this stressful time, while maintaining continued academic growth.


Within days of closing, our remote learning platform was up and running and our teachers were providing all of our students (even our Pre-K (3-4 year old) students) with much needed structure, community, and continued education. We are grateful to have staff with the skill set and open mindedness to be able to so quickly have shifted to a remote learning format, and to have the resources to have allowed our students to begin learning immediately. While not ideal, we found ways to support spiritual growth, keep students engaged in our community, and maintain our academic growth expectations throughout the remainder of the 2019/2020 school year.

Our staff then spent the summer months preparing for what would be an unprecedented year in education. We prepared operating plans, planned for different possible scenarios, reviewed and improved on our remote learning plans from last spring, and learned everything we could about the ever-evolving health and safety recommendations and practices.

Just 2 weeks before our first day of school, CDH announced that Ada County was experiencing the highest level of COVID spread (Category 3) and advised that students and staff not return to on-site instruction. Despite our original plans to offer only remote learning during such a period, we made the determination that we could safely begin school by bringing our PreK fully back on-site and by meeting with K-8 students in small groups. That period was followed by a two week period of remote instruction, further followed by bringing all students back on campus in a hybrid model of learning on September 1. This hybrid model invited all K-8 students to return to our campus for daily in-person instruction half of the day and remote instruction for the other half of the day (with half of our students on campus in the morning and half in the afternoon). This structure limited the number of students on campus at one time but allowed us to deliver quality instruction and time with teachers and classmates every day. While this model did not come without sacrifice, it was successful in balancing the safety of our staff and students with the desire to return to on-site instruction. This hybrid period allowed us time to teach students and staff new safety protocols and evaluate the effectiveness of our on-site mitigation strategies.

Finally, on October 5, we were able to achieve our goal of offering fully in-person, all day instruction to all of our students. In addition, throughout this period and for the remainder of the school year, we continue to provide remote instruction to a significant number of families who have chosen to remain in remote learning during this uncertain time.

We ask that you continue to pray for our staff, students, and families as we continue to navigate this challenging, confusing, and constantly evolving school year. Pray that we continue to show one another grace, patience, and understanding as we all try to make decisions that support the "greatest good" for our families, our school, and our community.



## WCEA ACCREDITATION

This fall, St. Ignatius completed the last stage of the Western Catholic Education Association accreditation process. During this process, we diligently tracked student and school-wide data, utilized a wide range of stakeholder feedback, and assessed our programs and Catholicity. We used this data to self-evaluate, issue a detailed self assessment report, and create data driven goals for the future. In September, a WCEA team of outside educators visited our school, observed our staff and students, and visited with students, staff, and stakeholders in order to evaluate our program and our self-study on behalf of WCEA.




We are so excited to report that our WCEA accreditation self study report and our visit were amazingly successful. WCEA evaluated St. Ignatius and our self report based on 11 WCEA Accreditation Factors. Our accreditation panel measured our school's effectiveness in each factor as determined by utilizing a rubric that includes objective criteria for measurement. While we will not receive our official accreditation until this summer, the report that was issued by our accreditation panel determined that St. Ignatius is "effective" or "highly effective" is all categories that are evaluated- a huge accomplishment for any school but particularly exciting for a new school.

The Visiting Committee concluded their report with the following statement:

"The Visiting Committee observed tremendous Gogorra during our visit to St. Ignatius Catholic School. There is an exceptional spirit of community and support for Cura Personalis. It is evident that the school is proud of its ability to provide personalized education for each student in heart, body, mind, and soul. The students and parents display genuine affection and admiration for the entire faculty and staff. The faculty and staff are providing a high-quality Catholic education to students in the Treasure Valley during a time of great transition - when we need to rely on our faith more than ever. The Visiting Committee commends the school for its commitment to continuous improvement through the WCEA accreditation process. God bless St. Ignatius Catholic School in their journey; we wish them the best as they continue their work in providing a high-quality Catholic education in the Diocese of Boise for many years to come. Dear St. Ignatius Family,

I want to take a moment to thank each of you for the generosity you have shown to St. Ignatius Catholic School during the 2019-2020 school year. I am constantly inspired by the amazing acts of generosity that I see within our school family-- not just from our financial donors, but from those who volunteer their time and talent in furtherance of our common mission to provide Catholic education to the children of our community. I am always amazed by the things that can be accomplished when a community comes together with a common purpose.

At its core, Catholic education is about a belief that our children grow best within a community that celebrates faith, and where the spirit can be nurtured alongside the mind and body. Our mission at Holy Apostles and St. Ignatius is that such an education be accessible to all those who wish to pursue it. Providing an affordable Catholic education is possible because of the generosity of our donors.

2020 has presented even greater financial need within our school community. In addition to our expected year-to-year financial needs, our school has incurred over \$130,000 in unexpected costs this year as a result of the pandemic and our commitment to provide a healthy and safe in-person learning experience to our families during this time. These additional costs have included hiring of additional staff, purchase and installation of air ionization equipment, and investment in additional health and safety equipment (such as thermometers, PPE, and mitigation equipment for our classrooms). In addition, we have experienced a greater need for financial assistance from our school families since last spring.

Given these unexpected financial burdens and the fact that our typical fundraising events will be limited this year, our Gray Wolves Giving Annual Appeal will be more important than ever in the coming months. I am asking our entire community of parents, parishioners, neighbors, alumni and partners to prayerfully consider financially supporting St. Ignatius Catholic School this year through this annual appeal. My hope is that every person who believes in the mission of St. Ignatius Catholic School will participate in this annual appeal in whatever amount their budget will allow. Whether it is a \$50 gift or a \$2000 gift, I ask that every person in our community invest in our mission.

#### **GRAY WOLVES GIVING ANNUAL APPEAL & IDAHO EDUCATION TAX CREDIT**

St. Ignatius Catholic School relies on the philanthropic generosity of our community to maintain our current tuition/income model. Your gifts "bridge the gap" between the actual cost to educate a student at St. Ignatius and the amount of tuition paid for each student. Without substantial financial support from our community, we will not be able to maintain these substantial tuition discounts. That means that every student who attends St. Ignatius benefits from the generosity of our donors.

Gray Wolves Giving provides donors with a vehicle to make an incredibly tax effective contribution directly to the school by taking advantage of the Idaho Education Tax Credit. Using the Idaho Education Tax Credit, it doesn't have to cost a lot to make a big difference at St. Ignatius Catholic School.

The Idaho Education Tax Credit lets you support Idaho Catholic Schools with dollars you would otherwise pay on your Idaho Income Tax Return. The State will CREDIT 50% of the first \$500 for an individual or \$1000 for a married couple filing jointly. In addition, the normal charitable deduction permits you to deduct the amount of your contribution on your Federal Income Tax Return as well as on your State Income Tax Return. (If you itemize your deductions). Depending on your tax bracket and liability, your contribution to St. Ignatius could cost you very little.

The chart below shows examples of how the Idaho Education Tax Credit works based on the 35% marginal tax bracket and itemized taxpayer return. You must have a large enough tax obligation to qualify. Figures are estimates. As always, we recommend discussing your specific tax situation with your tax advisor.
